#### **Farm Requirements**

_	ants must understand and have systems and practices in place to ensure that the below criteria is met tick each one to indicate you do):
0	Stock are tagged and movements recorded and reported in accordance with legislation
0	Stockmen are competent and trained/ experienced in what they do
0	Stock are handled in a way that does not compromise their welfare
0	Stock are checked regularly, particularly young animals/ animals close to giving birth
0	Stock are under the routine care of a vet
0	III or injured animals receive treatment without undue delay. If the animal has to be culled, it is dispatched humanely
0	Facilities to segregate ill/ injured animals are available
0	A completed health plan (including biosecurity policy) is available and a review of the plan and health and performance is undertaken annually
0	Competent persons administer medicines and perform husbandry procedures such as tagging, castration and disbudding
0	Medicines used are authorised by a vet, within the use by date and stored in a locked store according to the instructions (i.e. in a cool, dry store or a fridge)
0	Unused medicines, empty bottles and sharps are disposed of safely (normally via a vet)
0	A disinfectant (suitable to kill relevant livestock diseases) is available
0	Stock are provided with an adequate diet and water, that maintains health and condition
0	Newborns receive adequate colostrum
0	Feed is of a type permitted by legislation, does not contain animal by-products and is traceable to the place of production. If bought-in feed is not from an assured source (UFAS, FEMAS members or assured farms), feed warranty declarations accompany the feed delivery
0	Feed is stored in clean conditions and in a way that avoids contamination
0	A system is in place to control vermin
0	Housing and handling facilities are maintained and free from projections that could cause stock pain. Housing is effectively ventilated and lit
0	Stock are grouped according to size, age and production status – and animals with a risk of bullying segregated
0	Stock kept outside have access to a sheltered, well-trained lying area
0	Carcases are removed from housing/ fields promptly, stored appropriately and disposed of via a registered collector

## ADDITIONAL INFORMATION 2 – CATTLE REARING REGISTER IMPLEMENTATION

This paper outlines in more detail how the Cattle Rearing Register will be operated.

#### **Industry Ownership Group**

#### <u>Terms of Reference</u>

The RTA B&L Board believes it is important for the CR Register to be an industry wide initiative rather than RTA. A project management group will be set up with the following terms of reference:

- To oversee the tender and appointment of an Administration Service Provider
- To agree and oversee the implementation of a recruitment communication plan
- To receive management progress reports from the Administration Service Provider and monitor their performance

#### **Group Members**

RTA will provide secretariat to this group until such a time as a Service Provider is appointed after which they will provide secretariat function.

- Farmers x 2 (NFU & NBA nominated)
- Auction market x 2 (LAA nominated)
- Meat Processor x 2 (nominated together by BMPA & AIMS)
- Multiple Retailer x 1 (nominated by BRC)
- RTA B&L TAC Chairman
- FAWL
- NIBL QFAS
- RTA B&L Sector Manager
- Secretariat

#### **Administration Service Provider**

The operation of the CR Register will be contracted to a third party who will be responsible for:

- Setting up an administration system capable of receiving applications, recording
  information on a central database and issuing CR Registration documentation. This
  system must be capable of receiving paper applications and possibly on-line applications
  (subject to cost)
- Ensuring a full up-to-date secure listing of all CR Registered farms is available on-line
- Providing a helpline for farmers to call with queries about the application forms
- Managing the production of application packs for farmers (to contain an application form, leaflet explaining the benefits of being a CRR farmer and how to join).
- Managing the production of other communication materials as required (e.g. posters, pop-up banners etc)
- Provide a CR Register Co-ordinator responsible for recruiting farmers through working
  with key industry stakeholders (e.g. auction markets and meat processors). The
  expectation is that this role will be field based for an individual with good communication
  skills, detailed understanding of the cattle sector and knowledge of the key contacts
  within the farming, auction market and livestock procurement sectors. (This role may be
  a separate appointment or someone who works for the Administration Service Provider.)

#### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION 3 - BEEF FARM STANDARDS

Both Option 1 (Batch System) and Option 2 (Individual Animal System) include a change to the Beef Farm Assurance Standards.

The relevant current standards are as follows:

#### TI.c Key

#### Controls must be in place to ensure assurance status of livestock being sold as assured

- If livestock are purchased from a market, the market is assured
- Livestock sent for slaughter are kept on beef and lamb assured farms for the minimum residency period (i.e. 90 days for cattle, 60 days for sheep)
- Livestock stay on the farm for the whole time period or checks are made that the previous owner was farm assured
- Vehicles used to transport livestock are assured, either under the farm scheme, the Red Tractor Livestock Transport scheme (or equivalent). Hauliers' membership numbers are known
- Only livestock that meet the above criteria are sold as farm assured

#### Tl.c.1 Recommendation

It is recommended that bought-in livestock are bought from a farm assured farm

- Holdings are assured to the RTA Beef and Lamb scheme, Farm Assured Welsh Livestock Scheme, NIBL FQAS, QMS Cattle and Sheep scheme
- Checks are made to verify the holding that livestock originates from is assured

#### **Proposed Changes:**

#### Option 1

- Once the CR Register is up and running then the current recommendation TI.c.1 would be upgraded to a standard and reworded so all bought in livestock must be sourced from either a farm assured farm, a farm which is on the Cattle Rearing Register or a farm which is a member of the Cattle Rearing Scheme.
- Standard TI.c would remain unchanged as farmers selling livestock for slaughter will be required to continue to meet the 90 days fully farm assured residency period.

#### Option 2

 Once the CR Register is up and running then the current recommendation Standard TI.c would be incorporated into Standard TI.c so all livestock **sold as assured** must be sourced from either a farm assured farm, a farm which is on the Cattle Rearing Register or a farm which is a member of the Cattle Rearing Scheme.
